Next Up: Green Jobs for Women, Kinda

Health care reform is dominating the debate in every corner of Washington, DC right now but what is next on the agenda? The answer is green jobs for women, sorta. While Congress, the media and the general public are focusing on passing or killing health care reform, a select few are hammering out the details of climate change legislation, which is number two on the Obama Administration's agenda.

The climate change bill, known officially as the [American Clean Energy and Security Act](#), passed the House and is awaiting Senate consideration. The bill contains funding for projects that target green jobs and training opportunities for women and other underserved communities.

In many ways, the greening of jobs is a new approach to old "non-traditional" occupations. Green jobs will be created in manufacturing, constructions and information technology--all sectors where women are underrepresented. In workforce jargon, these occupations are known as "nontraditional jobs" for women, because women make up 25 percent or less of that workforce. Nontraditional jobs for women often pay 20 to 30 percent more than those traditionally female jobs and often provide better benefits, greater career and training opportunities and higher job satisfaction.

While the U.S. workforce faces many obstacles with unemployment and under-employment, there are new opportunities for the future.

Labor Day was created to celebrate the economic and social achievements of our nation's workers. For [Business and Professional Women's \(BPW\) Foundation](#)--- we're reminded of the many ways women can excel in the nation's newest labor sector: [the green economy](#).

Since BPW Foundation's inception, we have worked to create opportunities for women in non-traditional fields to improve their earning potential. And we have some great ideas on how women can capitalize in newly created green jobs. The latest step in this vital effort is our project, [Moving from Red to Green: Workingwomen in the Green Economy](#). This initiative will increase training opportunities for women ready to join the greening of the workforce.

The *new* green economy is the perfect start. Together we have the power to shape a labor market that can be both inclusive and equal for working women. And as women move into decision making roles within the green sector, according to BPW Foundation research, women's salaries and career advancement opportunities increase; therefore women are better able to support themselves and their families.

Fast Facts

- In 2008, 6 out of every 10 women were labor force participants, compared with 7 out of 10 men.
- The most common single occupation for women is 'secretary and administrative assistants,' employing over 5% of all full-time women workers
- 41% of women work in occupations that are 75 percent or more female (where at least three out of four workers are female).
- There are more than 3,400 companies in the solar energy sector that employ 30,000 to 40,000 workers
- Revenue for the three major clean-energy sectors — solar photovoltaics, wind power, and biofuels — grew by 53% from 2007 to 2008.
